





2024 Population by Race/Ethnicity









Childcare Assistance Program

The New Mexico Child Care Assistance Program subsidizes the cost of child care for families at or below 400% of the federal poverty level that are working, in school, or searching for employment.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services defines affordable child care as no more than 7% of a family's annual income. To date, no other state has enacted a child care support program that provides no-cost care to such a broad economic demographic.

Copayments are currently being waived for families on the Child Care Assistance program. ECECD will give providers and families three months' notice prior to reinstatement of copayments.



Quality of Place Investments

The Albuquerque Rail Trail

This \$70-90 million, 7-mile urban multi-use trail will link Albuquerque's vibrant downtown area to nearby neighborhoods, cultural destinations, entertainment districts, mass transportation options, and the Rail Yards. The trail will also feature zones throughout that highlight artistic representations of the culture and history of New Mexico.

Tax Increment Development District (TIDD) & Metropolitan Redevelopment Area (MRA)


The City of Albuquerque established a TIDD in 2021 that will utilize a portion of gross receipts and property taxes generated from future commercial development to fund public improvements like streets, drainage, water& sewer lines, as well as transit improvements, trails and recreation facilities that is expected to fund more \$500 million worth of investment into the University of New Mexico South campus area. In addition, statewide changes to MRA laws across the state in 2023 have now allowed the MRA in downtown Albuquerque to utilize tax increment financing for public infrastructure investment that is estimated to total nearly \$300 million over the next 20 years.

Unlocking Economic Transformation

Strategic Initiatives Underway

I-40 Tradeport Corridor

Public and private group came together to collaborate on the development of a first of its kind multistate clean energy – logistics – investment system

Not a public project, but a project catalyzed by public and private interests and delivered as a private led investment plan

Port of Los Angeles and public bodies in Arizona and New Mexico, GLDPartners, trucking, rail, logistics, clean energy, risk capital investors



BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT DISTRICTS: WHAT, WHY, HOW?

A well-structured BID offers numerous advantages for both businesses and property owners within a designated district, offering services above and beyond basic benefits offered to all areas of the City. They are concentrated within a distinct geographic area, paid for by a special property owner assessment, and services managed by a not for profit organization governed by a Board of Directors that represents those who pay. Services provided by a BID can include, but are not limited to:

HOW IS A BID CREATED IN NM?:

A petition to form a BID brought before the City Council is only the FIRST STEP in the initial process of exploring the formation of a BID.

A petition to form a BID does not provide any guarantee or requirement that a BID actually be formed. State Statute requirements for the process include:

- 1.A petition of 51% of property owners OR businesses within a boundary to the City, requesting the establishment of a BID
- 2.The appointment by the City of a planning group to lead the efforts
- 3. The creation of a plan through stakeholder input that includes a statement of purpose, a description of the boundaries, and final assessment calculations
- 4. Following the Plan completion, a Public Hearing must be held following notice by the City Clerk (requires notice to all property owners affected)
- 5. Final recommendation and potential action by City Council to form the district

INCREASED SAFETY

BIDs can invest in additional security measures, such as security patrols or improved lighting, to deter crime and create a safer environment for everyone.

2 ALIGNED ADVOCACY

A BID fosters a collaborative environment where property owners can work collectively to address shared concerns and advocate for the district's interests.

MAINTENANCE & BEAUTIFICATION

A BID can allocate resources for improved cleaning, landscaping, and streetscape enhancements throughout the district.

4 MARKETING & EVENTS

A BID can use collective funds to deliver marketing and promotional campaigns, and manage and operate special events to attract visitors.



Other services can include public space regulation like managing parking, sidewalk vending, street performances, public art, etc. Think planter boxes, street banners and signage, lighting, and even facade improvements.
